Dear Group Members:

This year's annual conference of the Association of American Geographers was held in Los Angeles, 19-23 March, 2002. More than 70 papers were presented on topics related to recreation, tourism, and sport, many of which were organized in the five sessions sponsored this year by the Recreation, Tourism, and Sport (RTS) Specialty Group. The RTS-sponsored sessions this year focused on several themes, including Island Tourism Dynamics: Issues of Insularity and Culture; Tourism in the Developing World; The Human-Environment Interface in Recreation and Tourism; Tourism, Globalization and Culture; and Travel to the Promised Lands: Tourism, Space and Diaspora. The sessions were well attended and included many high-quality and interesting papers. Participation in this year's conference was notably global, including presenters from the United States, Canada, Austria, New Zealand, Australia, Brazil, Korea, Greece, and the United Kingdom. This trend toward globalization of the AAG conferences has grown notably in recent years. Let's hope that the RTS sessions of the AAG will continue to draw scholars from around the world. It seems to enrich our scholarly interaction.

I would like to thank all of you who worked hard to help organize and chair sessions at the AAG. By all accounts the sessions were a success. Thank you also to the individual presenters, who made the conference a success. I, the RTS Board and the group membership at large, wish to express our appreciation to Rob Bristow for his diligent service at the Newsletter editor over the past several years. Canada-China Higher Education Project

Geoff Wall, University of Waterloo, reports on a project entitled "Environmental Training for Integrated Monitoring and Management in the Coastal Zone of Hainan Province, China". This project is now nearing completion but forms the base of a new CIDA Tier 1 project, funded at almost \$4 million over six years, on "Eco-planning and Environmental Management in Coastal Cities in China" (Ecoplan China for short). Geoff is also providing input on ecotourism into a project on biodiversity protection and community development in Inner Mongolia. While these projects are not specifically on tourism but have a broader environmental orientation, all have substantial tourism components. Geoff was also recently awarded an SSHRC research grant for a project entitled *--Authenticating cultural experiences in Hainan and Taiwan.*

Sustainable Tourism and Environment Program at University of Northern Iowa (UNI)

The U.S. Department of Education, Fund for the Improvement of Post-Secondary Education grant helps UNI expand program to provide service learning and research for tourism and the environment.

Dr. Sam Lankford obtained a Department of Education grant to implement a program that funds projects which connects tourism issues with environmental quality. STEP-UP (Sustainable Tourism and Environment Program-University Partnerships) builds collaborative relationships between students and faculty from diverse disciplines with industry and communities. The program will create opportunities for applied research and service projects that benefit Iowa's environment as well as its tourism planning process. UNI students are currently
